Broadcasting is currently at the centre of political and social debates in the former communist countries of East-Central Europe. And, as such, is a useful barometer of the kind of transitions taking place in the region.

The colloquium aims to provide a forum for social scientists from East and West to discuss changes in television broadcasting in the Czech and Slovak Republics, Hungary, Poland and Slovenia. It will develop further the debates addressed at the Centre's symposium on the restructuring of East European television last year in July 1992.

The colloquium will be held from 20th to the 22nd October 1993 in Central London. The three day event will consist of themed sessions of papers followed by lively and open discussions. Attendance will be by invitation.

Social scientists with original theoretical or empirical research in television in East-Central Europe are invited to offer papers. Some financial support may be available for those invited.
