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DAVID HONIG -- BIOGRAPHICAL STATEMENT

David Honig is a communications lawyer with offices in Washington, D.C. and Miami, Florida. His FCC clients include the NAACP, LULAC, the National Rainbow Coalition and several other organizations, as well as broadcasters and broadcast applicants. His commercial representation has focused on litigation of contested proceedings for new facilities as well as broadcast station transactions.

Mr. Honig is a member of the bars of the D.C. Court of Appeals, the U.S. District Court for the District of Columbia, the D.C. Circuit and Second Circuit of the U.S. Court of Appeals, and the U.S. Supreme Court. He has litigated seventeen federal appeals in four courts, and participated in over 80 FCC rulemaking proceedings and hundreds of adjudicatory cases.

In 1986, Mr. Honig founded the organization now known as the Minority Media and Telecommunications Council. It coordinates FCC rulemaking and policy litigation on behalf of national minority organizations. He serves pro bono as its Executive Director and principal counsel. In 1994, he became the first Director/Counsel of the Association of Black Owned Television Stations.

From 1975 to 1985, Mr. Honig taught communications policy, research and law at the School of Communications, Howard University. Mr. Honig served as an adjunct lecturer at Catholic University's Columbus School of Law in the spring of 1988, teaching the advanced seminar in International Regulation of Communications. He has been a frequent guest lecturer at Georgetown University Law Center, taught Communications Law at Morgan State University in 1993-1994, and he currently teaches Civil Rights Litigation at the University of Miami School of Law. He has published numerous journal articles, monographs and empirical research studies on a variety of topics concerning international and domestic communications issues. He is the author of law review articles on group defamation, minority broadcast station ownership, and municipal services discrimination.

Mr. Honig was a U.S. Delegate to the 1979 World Administrative Radio Conference in Geneva, where he helped write the ITU's rules governing AM radio. He has chaired working groups of the FCC's Advisory Committee on Radio Broadcasting and Advisory Committee on Broadcast Satellite Service Planning.

The holder of a B.A. degree in mathematics from Oberlin College and an M.S. Degree in Systems Analysis from the University of Rochester, Mr. Honig earned his J.D. cum laude in 1983 from Georgetown University Law Center. His home is Miami Beach, Florida, where he serves as General Counsel of the Miami-Dade Branch of the NAACP.
