BRIAN R. MOIR

Brian R. Moir is an attorney in private practice in Washington, D.C., where he specializes in telecommunications. His practice includes administrative, legislative, and public policy advocacy before the Federal Communications Commission, Congress, executive branch agencies, state regulatory commissions, and state and federal courts. Mr. Moir represents various entities, including the largest association of business telecommunications users (the International Communications Association), the American Petroleum Institute, and the National Association of Broadcasters. Additionally, he chairs the Unity Coalition, the largest telecommunications legislative coalition in the United States.

Prior to telecommunications law practice, Mr. Moir served for six years as Senior Legal Counsel and Committee Parliamentarian to the U.S. House of Representatives' Committee on Energy and Commerce, where he was responsible for the telecommunications, foreign commerce, and trade jurisdiction of the Committee. Previously, he served as a staff attorney at the Federal Communications Commission and as Assistant Corporate Counsel for Tele-Communications, Inc., the nation's largest owner of cable television systems and a miscellaneous microwave common carrier, in Denver, Colorado.

During Mr. Moir's more than twenty years in the private and governmental sectors, he has gained considerable experience in telecommunications and information law, and related government relations and trade matters. He has been a member of the Ad Hoc Strategic Planning Group of the U.S. Department of State's CCITT National Advisory Committee and has served as a member of numerous U.S. delegations on international telecommunications issues. He has frequently appeared as an expert witness before various U.S. Congressional Committees, written numerous articles on telecommunications issues, lectured extensively, and has spoken before many leading industry associations and forums.

Mr. Moir received his Juris Doctorate from the University of Denver College of Law, 1971, where he was honored with the International Legal Studies Award and was a member of the Denver Journal of International Law and Policy.
