These programs are designed to identify effective approaches for preventing and treating alcohol and other drug use and related problems among High-risk Youth, and among Pregnant Women and Their Infants. The annual budget for the programs of the Division is approximately \$120 million and includes a grant portfolio of approximately 380 projects, support and evaluation contracts totalling \$10 million and a National Pregnancy Resource Center, with a budget of \$5 million per annum.

Responsibilities include oversight of two branches and an administrative unit; total division staff is 32 professionals and support staff. Professionals include psychiatrists, obstetricians, sociologists, psychologists, social workers, and public health professions.

These two programs receive great public visibility and are of great importance throughout the Department and the Congress, necessitating high level administrative skills in overseeing the program.

Responsibilities include sponsoring national conferences and workshops, generating publications that contain assessment of risk factors and resiliency factors, successful approaches used with different ethnic populations, and substance abuse prevention in public housing.
