

GUIDELINES FOR MANUSCRIPT PREPARATION

As you will note (Please see the Final Contributors' List), 24 contributors will cover 19 issues relative to the U.S. media coverage of the Middle East. Our publisher (Greenwood Press) has put a maximum limit of 100,000 words, including table of contents, forward, introduction, about authors, index, etc., on this anthology. Hence, the authors are strongly encouraged to follow the following guidelines:

1. Manuscripts should not exceed 5,000 words (about 20 pages of double-spaced, typewritten copy, including references, tables and figures).
2. Prepare the manuscript in accordance with the *Publication Manual of the American Psychological Association* (APA), Third Edition.
3. Send the original and one copy of the manuscript along with a copy on a high density (HD) floppy disc (3.5 or 5 1/4", Word or Word Perfect) to the editor by March 30, 1994.
4. Place title, the name(s) of author(s), position(s), institutional affiliation(s), telephone and fax numbers on a separate title page.
5. Double-space all portions of the manuscript, including references, tables, figures, and quotations. All margins (top, bottom, left, right) must be 1.5 inches.
6. Do not use footnotes or endnotes; incorporate the information in the text.
7. Use the APA reference style, listing only references cited in the text (manuscript).
8. Proofread and double check the references before submitting your manuscript.
9. Number all pages (except figure pages) in sequence, starting with the title page.
10. Explain all necessary abbreviations in the text, tables, and figures.
11. Include a brief (about 100 words) biography of yourself on a separate sheet of paper.
12. Please mail your essay as soon as possible but no later than March 30, 1994.

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OBJECTIVES:

- 1) To present a multifaceted analysis of the U.S. media portrayal of the Middle East (e.g., Middle East cultures, peoples, religions, politics, conflicts) written by the communication experts and scholars;
- 2) To present examples of the U.S. media's stereotypical coverage of the Middle Eastern issues and cultures (e.g., Arabs, Palestinians, Iranians, Kurds, Islam, women, conflicts);
- 3) To discuss the correlation between the U.S. media portrayal and the perceived image of the Middle East by the American public;
- 4) To note the negative and positive aspects of the U.S. media coverage of the Middle East vis-à-vis international relations, peace, harmony, and the post Cold War New World Order.
- 5) To speculate on mass media's role, as arbiters of reality, in formation of public image and perception.

RATIONALE

The time, public interest, and the market seem ripe for a comprehensive book devoted entirely to the U.S. media coverage of the Middle East. Overall, this vital and volatile region of the world has been ignored, misunderstood, and misperceived for too long by academia, the mass media, and the American public in general. Except for reports of disasters, revolutions and coups, generated by the mass media in the United States, the American public knows very little about the Middle Eastern countries. Furthermore, whatever the American public knows about the Middle East has often been negative, stereotypical, and far from reality. In addition, the Middle Eastern countries are often lumped together as if they were a single entity devoid of any separate national identity, cultural integrity, religious ideology, political philosophy, or global sensitivity.

The proposed book will attempt, for the very first time, to present a comprehensive discussion and analysis of the U.S. mass media's portrayal of the Middle East peoples, culture, and issues by communication scholars and Middle East experts. While it would be the goal of the text to take the reader beyond the pervasive "stereotypical" images of the Middle Eastern countries, it would be implicitly understood that the proposed book will be accessible to those individuals keenly interested in enhancing their knowledge of the Middle East. This book will not only be

written for scholars and students, but also for media professionals (i.e., journalists, reporters), instructors, researches, and the general public.

It goes without saying that in view of the high prominence of the Middle East in the U.S. news media, particularly during the recent Persian Gulf War, this book would be of interest and attractive to numerous people around the globe. As the mass media take us through a period of profound change, both nationally and internationally, the need for the proposed book becomes clearly evident.

The U.S. Media Coverage of the Middle East would represent a major contribution to the canon of literature devoted to the study of the Middle East and international communication.

STRUCTURE

The book will consist of 15-20 essays, each focusing on a specific aspect of the U.S. media coverage of the Middle Eastern peoples, cultures, and issues (e.g., image of the Arabs, image of the Iranians, image of the Palestinians, image of Islam, image of women, war, regional conflicts, terrorism, morality, etc.)

CONTRIBUTORS

Each essay, covering a specific issue vis-à-vis the U.S. media portrayal or coverage of the Middle East, will be written by a contributing mass communications scholar or media expert in the United States. To insure a significant

degree of diversity, depth, and scope, attempts will be made to engage both the American and native Middle Eastern scholars (teaching or researching in the U.S.) in this vital project.

LENGTH AND STYLE

The maximum length of the proposed book will be 100,000 words, including table of contents, forward, acknowledgments, indexes, bibliographies, etc. Approximately 25 double-spaced typed pages (4,500 words maximum) will be devoted to each issue. Of course, some issues may require fewer pages and others more pages to be covered sufficiently.

All articles must be written according to the American Psychological Association (APA), third edition, style manual.

DELIVERY DATES

- 1) By October 30, 1993, a complete list of the contributing authors shall be forwarded to the publisher.
- 2) By March 30, 1994, two copies of the FINAL draft of each essay shall be submitted to the compiling editor by each contributing scholar. Also, each author is requested to submit a copy of his/her essay on a high density floppy disc (3.5" or 5 1/4", Word or Word Perfect).
- 4) By May 30, 1994, the entire book manuscript shall be forwarded to the publisher by the compiling editor.

NOTE: All articles must be carefully proofread, tightly edited, and written according to the APA style guidelines.

Please double-space the entire essay, including quotations and references. All margins (top, bottom, right, left) must be 1.5 inches.

COMPETING VOLUMES

To this date, no text of the same content, scope, and coverage exists on the market. Although, several books (e.g., Split Vision, Covering Islam, TV Arabs, The U.S. Press and Iran) have focused on a specific country, religion or ethnicity, none of the existing books present a comprehensive picture of the Middle East as a whole. For instance, none of the published books:

- (1) covers the range of issues proposed in this book;
or
- (2) includes essays by a diverse group of distinguished Middle Eastern scholars and experts.

However, the following books do, to a limited extent, compete with the proposed book:

- Mowlana, H., Gerbner, G., & Schiller, H. (Eds.). (1992). Triumph of the Image: The Media's War in the Persian Gulf--A Global Perspective. Boulder, CO.: Westview Press. (Focuses on the Persian Gulf War.)
- Said, Edward W. (1981). Covering Islam. New York: Pantheon Books. (Dated.)
- Shaheen, Jack. (1984). TV Arabs. Bowling Green, OH.: Popular Culture Press. (Focuses on the TV portrayal of the Arabs; dated.)

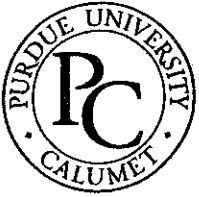
