Joan Shorenstein Barone is remembered by all who worked with her as one of the most dedicated professionals ever to enter the field of political journalism. As a tribute to her and to the standards she set for accurate, thorough and dignified reporting of current events, the Joan Shorenstein Center on the Press, Politics and Public Policy was established in September of 1986. Joan was born in San Francisco. She was elected to Phi Beta Kappa at Mills College and went on to pursue graduate studies at Harvard University. In 1970, she entered journalism as a political researcher for *The Washington Post*. In 1973, she joined CBS as a researcher and the following year became an associate producer of "Face the Nation." She was appointed producer of the program in 1979. After the 1984 political campaign, during which she was a CBS news producer specializing in politics, Joan joined the Washington staff of "The CBS Evening News with Dan Rather" as a producer, the position she held at the time of her death in 1985.

OVERVIEW

The Joan Shorenstein Center on the Press, Politics and Public Policy is a Harvard research center dedicated to exploring the intersection of these three areas. The Center strives to bridge the gap between journalists and scholars and, increasingly, between them and the public. Through teaching and research at the Kennedy School of Government and through its program of fellows and conferences, the Center is at the forefront of discussions in this area.

In its ninth year of existence, the Center has emerged as a major source for research on U.S. campaigns and elections, U.S. journalism and public policy, international journalism, and race, gender and the press. It is a widely respected convener of journalists, scholars and political activists working to help the press improve its role in democracy.

PUBLIC PROGRAMS

Monday roundtable seminars and Tuesday brown bag lunches highlight the Center's efforts to attract interesting speakers who share their expertise and experience with Kennedy School students throughout the academic year. The Center sponsors programs and conferences to improve discussion of and reflection on the impact of the press on politics and public policy. Now in its seventh year, the Theodore H. White Lecture on Press and Politics has been given by distinguished professionals such as Walter Cronkite, Benjamin C. Bradlee, Senator Warren B. Rudman, Daniel Schorr, and Cokie Roberts. The 1995 Theodore H. White Lecturer is William F. Buckley Jr., author, editor, lecturer, and host of *Firing Line*.

FELLOWSHIP PROGRAM

The Joan Shorenstein Center selects a small number of seasoned journalists and scholars to spend a semester researching and writing a paper on a press/politics topic. This resident fellowship is a unique opportunity for individuals distinguished in the field of press/politics to participate in and contribute to the intellectual life and research activities of the Center, as well as to attend weekly roundtable seminars, luncheon speakers series, and other organized programs. GOLDSMITH AWARDS

The Goldsmith Awards program offers a series of awards including a prize for investigative reporting, a book prize and grants for research in the field of press/politics. The \$25,000 Goldsmith Prize for Investigative Reporting is awarded annually. The \$5,000 Goldsmith Book prize is also awarded annually. The application deadline for both prizes is November 1. Applications for the Goldsmith Research Awards are accepted throughout the year and award recipients are notified quarterly.

PUBLICATIONS

The Center publishes reports, research and discussion papers written by journalists and scholars associated with the Center. Most research and discussion papers are the work of individual Fellows written during their semester-long stay at the Center.

The Harvard International Journal of Press/Politics is dedicated to analyzing the interaction of the press, politics and public policymaking. The journal is published by the MIT Press with four issues per annum, from January, 1996 onwards. The editors are Marvin Kalb and Pippa Norris; Keith Reeves is the book review editor.
